Welcome to 2006 and the Centennial year for the Alpine Club of Canada. Back in 1906, Arthur Oliver Wheeler and Elizabeth Parker (below) founded our club in Winnipeg. The first mountaineering camp was held that year in the Yoho Valley. The following year the Canadian Alpine Journal was first published.

Since then, the ACC has grown to become Canada's national mountaineering organization with nearly 6000 members. Now the ACC runs a network of 24 wilderness huts, plus a wide range of general mountaineering camps. The ACC also sponsors skills development such as the ACC/ The North Face Summer and Winter Leadership courses. The CAJ continues to be a popular publication of modern-day mountaineering and climbing achievements.

To celebrate the past 100 years, the ACC has a number of special events planned at the National level and at the regional Section levels. For the Centennial, the Vancouver Section is organizing a camp at the Lake Lovelywater cabin in the Tantalus Range, on August 5-12, 2006. This is in addition to our traditional summer camps that are being planned for Tantalus Lake Lovelywater, Rogers Pass and other locations.

Report

2005 Tantalus Hut Report

The year 2005 saw a small increase in the use of the Tantalus Hut over 2004 with the hut hosting several summer camps. Early season bad weather resulted in a number of cancellations. Hut maintenance is always an ongoing necessity. In contemplation of the Alpine Club celebrating its 100th anniversary in 2006, and the Tantalus Hut being chosen to host a major summer camp as part of the centennial events, an extra effort was made to ensure the Tantalus Hut was suitably ready.

This year the Hut roof was checked and all roofing panels were tightened and treated to a new coat of the distinctive red roofing paint. In addition, the exterior walls, window frames and trim were completely repainted resulting in the Hut looking resplendent against the backdrop of the Tantalus Mountains and Lake Lovely Water.

The inside of the Hut received a wall to wall cleaning and the tables and benches were re-varnished. The Vancouver Section should be able to proudly showcase the Tantalus Hut to all those participating in the centennial camp.

The suspension bridge, constructed in 2004, survived its first winter test and only required a few minor adjustments. This bridge has been a welcome addition, affording safe crossing of the outflow creek, particularly during high water.

B.C. Parks was also busy this summer at Lake Lovely Water. The outhouse adjacent to the Hut was replaced by a new towering facility which has two large stainless steel tanks which enable all human waste to be flown out. This new outhouse is truly an engineering marvel! B.C. Parks also constructed four new tent platforms in the area adjacent to the Hut bringing the total to six platforms available for tent enthusiasts.

In response to calls for reduced helicopter traffic near the Hut, a new landing site was cleared about one-half a kilometer east of the Hut with an adjoining trail being established as well. The original landing site on the "rock" near the Hut will continue to be maintained as a landing site for emergencies and the delivery of camp supplies.

If you haven't been to Lake Lovely

Water and used the Tantalus Hut lately, you should consider giving this area a visit. Due to growing popularity you should reserve your next trip with the Custodian early to avoid disappointment.

B.C. Parks personnel have continued to be supportive this past year working closely with the Alpine Club to make this area enjoyable for all users.



Trip Report

Trekking in the Patagonia, Chile and Argentina Nov-Dec 2004

ACC'er Tania and Trish highly recommend anyone looking for a beautiful trek with some unusual backcountry comforts to hike Torres del Paine, National Park in the south of Chile. Six days afforded us with "wild camping" at the base of the towers, spectacular views of Glacier Grey and the best HOT outdoor shower in the world!

The "W" trek can be completed in 4 long days (76km) and 6-9 days are needed to do the circuit (123km). Our first 3 days were spent battling fierce winds, a blizzard and intermittent downpours. Refugios are available for those not wanting to haul a tent and are a great place to warm up with a pisco sour. You can even take a boat back to the beginning to avoid re-tracing your steps.

Puerto Natales, the gateway to the Park, is also the connection to El Calafate, Argentina, where the unbelievably huge Perito Moreno Glacier is – 30km in length, 195 km² surface, 4 km width and 30-60 meters in height! The sights and sounds were astonishing as the ice would break away and collapse into the Canal de los Tempanos (Iceberg Channel).

Other less solitude climbs include the smoking Villarrica Volcano in Pucon. No where else in the world, okay, North America, could you climb an active volcano and peer inside at the lava! The only unfortunate part of this was our estimation that we were two of 300 on the volcano that day and our 10 minute window before the descent was spent in a white-out.

Near the month end of our backpacking we ventured from Santiago to Aconcagua 6962m, Argentina, the highest mountain in the world after the Himalayas. Our day hike to the Horcones Lagoon afforded us with aching views to return another time with specific intentions!

Chile is an easy and safe place for travelers - particularly good for women, and as they say, it is made up of all the best South America has to offer: a little desert, a little mountain, a little ocean and a little forest.

Chic Scott & the Making of The Eiger Sanction

Film history and climbing culture featured in this entertaining look at a Hollywood cult classic, Jan. 14 at Squamish's Eagle Eye Theatre

In today's age of lawsuits and liability it would be unlikely to find Hollywood stars like Clint Eastwood dangling precariously 4,000 feet above the foreboding ice, snow and rock on the Eiger's north face. But renowned Canadian guide, mountaineer and writer Chic Scott remembers a different era, before cinematic sleight of hand and blue screens became the norm, when climbing films were as dangerous to make as the pastime they portrayed.

Thirty years after working on the classic climbing film *The Eiger Sanction*, Scott comes to Squamish's Eagle Eye Theatre (Howe Sound Secondary School), Saturday, January 14 at 7 pm & 9 pm, with his collection of "behind the scenes" slides and clips from the film to tell the story of another era in adventure movie making.

Tickets are \$12 in advance, \$15 at the door and are available at Climb On and Valhalla Pure in Squamish, and in Vancouver at the Fringe Café, 3124 W. Broadway.

The Eiger Sanction, the 1975 thriller directed by and starring Clint Eastwood, is the story of Jonathan Hemlock, an art teacher and collector who finances his hobby by performing the odd sanction (assassination) for an obscure government bureau. He is forced to take a case where he must find out which of the members of a mountain climbing team is the killer he has been given as a target by joining an expedition to climb the treacherous Eiger. It also starred George Kennedy, Vonetta McGee, and Jack Cassidy.

As for Chic Scott, it has been forty years since he discovered the magic of high places. During a lifetime of adventure he has climbed and skied around the world, organized clubs and foundations, written books and worked as a mountain guide. His odyssey has taken him from the icefields of the Canadian Rockies to the historic climbs of the European Alps, from the grandeur of the Himalayas to the icy solitude of Mount Logan.

The evening is presented by Fringe Filmworks' Ivan Hughes and Angela Heck, the team behind the 2003 film *In the Shadow of the Chief*. Since that time, the couple have moved to Squamish and are hoping to start a continuing series of speakers, workshops and films under the banner of the Squamish Adventure Film Society.

"Through our work, we've had the privilege of going to a lot of film festivals, specifically mountain film festivals, and have been seeing a lot of good work," says Ivan Hughes. "In an area like Squamish where there is a huge interest in adventure and a strong film presence, it seems like this is a good opportunity to bring the two together."

9th Vancouver International Mountain Film Festival

February 17-26, 2006; North Vancouver and Vancouver March – November 2006: on tour in Canada

The Vancouver International Mountain Film Festival (VIMFF) has been bringing films, multimedia shows and special events on mountain sports and mountain culture to Vancouver since 1998. Over the years, VIMFF has established itself as one of the key cultural events on Vancouver's North Shore.

The Festival's goal is to provide the outdoor and film communities of British Columbia with films and slide presentations dealing with mountain culture and mountain activities such as skiing, mountaineering, climbing, and mountain biking in an environmentally respectful way. The Festival aims to create a platform for the exchange of ideas between film makers, outdoor enthusiasts, athletes and the public, while at the same time encourage the most artistic and effective forms of communicating mountain-related experiences.

VIMFF traditionally brings to Vancouver world celebrities of mountaineering, climbing, skiing and mountain biking, and pairs them up with the back yard heroes, fringe personalities of the climbing world and with film screenings, photographic competition and exhibition, book readings, interactive seminars and special events in a forum intended to bring people together, to inspire. VIMFF supports young emerging Canadian filmmakers and innovative ways of creating a theatrical mountain experience.

VIMFF 2006 guest presenters will include Australia's Greg Child, one of the most accomplished and versatile mountaineers and climbers, a well-published author and an empathic and engaging presenter. Greg will be offering a Canadian premiere of his recent presentation, *Friends in High Places*: a light-hearted view of the past 30 years of climbing. The show will feature the 'superlatives' in his climbing career - the coldest climb he ever did, the most scared he ever got, the most unsuccessful expedition he ever went on, the strongest and the luckiest climber he ever met, the biggest mistake he ever made on a climb...).

Rumor has it that Alain Robert, the French Spiderman, will be visiting town, traversing the Vancouver city skyline, climbing a few skyscrapers along the way, spending a few days in prison, and presenting at VIMFF in the end. He has climbed most of the world's tallest artificial structures, including sky-scrappers, towers, bridges and pyramids, all of them solo, without rope, insurance and any margin for error. He climbs towers in all four corners of planet and at the same time visits many prisons in those same locations. "That's no problem", says Alain Robert, "I prefer stays in prison as opposed to stays at the hospital". Another motivating factor of his climbs has been meeting people, from all walks of life from criminals and poor people, to kings and presidents. VIMFF presentation of this wild elusive character of the climbing world, delivered in his unique unrepeatable accent, guarantees the highest level of entertainment and sweaty hands.

Klem Loskot, the "bouncing, muscular Austrian", is one of the strongest rock climbers of our times. He is able to send a French 9a (5.14d) route, a 8c boulder, and he is a Deep Water Soloing addict – he regularly deep water solos 8b (5.13d) 20 meters high up the sea level. He is not too much preoccupied with numbers and crash-pads, though. Klem's VIMFF multi-media presentation "Emotional Landscapes" is based on his own film clips, still images and gripping funny stories, intertwined with other people's material. "Emotional Landscapes" offers a glimpse into Klem's climbing career, it is about feelings, about a certain sense.

Vancouver's home grown alpine talent of Jeremy Frimer will bring his latest presentation, *Cut Loose, Karakoram*, in which Jeremy tells of his failed attempt at living the normal life, and his successful return to the big time as he ventured into the heart of the highest mountain ranges. Jeremy and a strong international team set sights on a monstrous unclimbed rock line on Trango II in the Karakoram. Going fast-and-light the team launched into the unknown of the 1700-metre line. Jeremy's VIMFF presentation focuses on the adventure that ensued both in terms of the physical punishment and personal evolution.

BC adventure photojournalist Kari Medig will show images from two of Western North America's longest ski traverses: the epic 2001 West Coast Ski Traverse and 2002 Over the Top expedition. He will also be sharing photos and stories from some of his favourite local winter ski touring playgrounds and then take a ride overseas with his latest ski touring exploits in Asia and Eastern Europe. Isabel Budke, Barry Mason and members of the North Shore Search and Rescue Team will revive the dramatic circumstances of the 2005 epic ascent of the Canada's highest peak in Thin, Cold Air: Being part of the 2005 Mt. Logan Rescue. Ian Hylands, a local mountain biking legendary photographer of international acclaim, will be part of VIMFF's traditionally very successful Mountain Biking Evening with his multi-media presentation: images of the local riders ripping the North Shore slopes, as well as pictures from world championships and various riding places on Earth.

VIMFF film selection will be announced three weeks before the actual event on the festival website, www.vimff.org. Other VIMFF special events will include library mountain book readings in conjunction with the North Vancouver District Public Library; a Polish and Czecho-Slovakian mountain film show; a white water show; and more. Following the event in Vancouver VIMFF takes on a Canadian tour to 25 communities across the country.

Vancouver Section Trip Schedule Winter 2006

GRADING GUIDELINES

- A - Less than 6 hrs travel/day (Not strenuous)
- B - 6 to 8 hrs travel/day (Moderately strenuous)
- C - 8 to 12 hrs travel/day (Strenuous)
- D - More than 12 hrs travel/day (Extremely strenuous)
- S - Slower-paced trip, (Suitable for seniors)

- 1 - Gentle slopes. Travel on trails over fairly level terrain.
- 2 - Moderate slopes. Travel may be off trail. Intermediate skiing ability recommended. Easy climbing.
- 3 - Travel in mountainous terrain. Steep forest and glaciers probable. Back country equipment and intermediate skiing experience required. Moderate climbing.
- 4 - Travel over difficult mountain terrain. Advanced back country and mountaineering experience, ability and equipment required. Advanced ski mountaineering or moderate to difficult ice or mixed climbing. Ropes and belays required.
- 5 - Technical ice or mixed climbing. Advanced climbing experience required.

Please contact trip organizers by the Wednesday prior to the trip or earlier to express your interest. Non-members are welcome to participate once or twice before joining, and are accepted on a space available basis. Everyone is welcome to attend our meetings at 7:30 p.m. in the Floral Hall of Van Dusen Botanical Gardens, W. 37th Ave. & Oak St. in Vancouver on the fourth Tuesday of every month (except July, Aug., Dec.).
